Meeting Focus: Engage leaders from public and private sectors to provide feedback and shape progress on ongoing Innovation Collaborative efforts to better integrate measurement and engagement to improve population health by involving people and communities in measurement development and evaluation, and accelerating the implementation of care at the intersection of medical and social needs.

Motivating questions:

- 1. **Vision:** How can the National Academy of Medicine (NAM) steward progress on the engagement of people and communities to lead to lasting system changes and improvement in health outcomes? How can the NAM leverage opportunities to use measurement of non-medical factors and meaningful community engagement to influence health and health outcomes?
- 2. **Barriers:** What are the systemic and organizational barriers to adopting and spreading the integration of measurement and engagement to improve care, health programs and policies?
- 3. **Strategies:** What approaches could be used to increase the engagement of people and communities, as well as measurement of that engagement, to improve health and health outcomes?

Outcomes anticipated: Feedback on development of measures of meaningful community engagement, and discussion on opportunities for the NAM to speed the use of engagement and measurement strategies to improve population health at intersection of clinical practice and social needs.
